



Community Support

The Youth Bureau provided opportunities for youth serving programs to share information and resources and for the community to respond to identified youth needs. The Youth Services Network provided information on the topics of: Zoo New York; Encompass Recreation; Access -VR; Raise the Lower Age of Juvenile Delinquency Program; Citizen's Advocates.

The Youth Services Network gathers information from all attendees about the programs they provide. Minutes are taken and posted on the Jefferson County Youth Bureau website.

Recreation Scholarships



Programs reported 2,502 children and youth attending Youth Bureau funded programs. (Children may have been counted more than once if they attended more than one program.)

Hearts For Youth (Hearts For Youth Inc. \$7,500)

A program focusing on life enrichment opportu-

nities that facilitate youth in volunteering and being an active and vital part of their community. After school



and summer programs encourage teamwork and camaraderie, building relationships, developing physical and cognitive skills and encouraging healthy, respectful, productive citizenship.


Career Camp (Jeff-Lewis BOCES \$10,838)

This course will prepare youth to start their own babysitting business in the Community. They will learn the skills needed to safely care for children, including CPR and First Aid. Youth are provided opportunities for career exploration, work readiness skill development, job/employment training skills development and self-sufficiency skill development.

Family Visitation Program (Resolution Center \$3,375)

This program provides separated families with an opportunity to receive enhanced visitation while promoting permanency and normalcy in the lives of children.





Youth Development

SoZo Teen Center (Children's Home of Jefferson County \$15,000)

To help local youth become productive and healthy adults, the SoZo Teen Center focuses on health and wellness, academics, job

readiness, life skills, and civic engagement. Dedicated staff and volunteers provide positive role models and ensure a safe and



enriching environment. Nutritous snacks and hot dinners are served daily. All services are provided free of charge.

Youth Court (Resolution Center \$3,750)

This program exists to hold youth offenders accountable for delinquent behaviors; to provide positive peer-led restorative justice that promotes leadership, self-improvement and a healthier attitude towards rules/ authority; and to increase knowledge and enhance refusal skills to avoid future behaviors and involvement in the ciriminal justice system.

Lyme Central School Summer Theater Institute (\$4,500)



Participating students in grades K -12 worked together to produce and present a high quality theater production to the local community.

Recreation Scholarships (Youth Bureau \$9,054)

Financial assistance helped to cover the costs of skill-building activities such as gymnastic classes and different camps for children from financially needy families. There was a dramatic increase in the number of kids applying for scholarships to attend overnight summer camps.

Child Abuse Prevention and Family Support

The Q Center (ACR Health \$10,000)

The center provides services,



activities and supports for our community's LGBTQ youth. The overall goal of the program is improved health and social-emotional outcomes for LGBTQ youth and their families



Youth Sports And Education Opportunity Funding

Sports & STEM (YMCA \$10,100)

Youth engaged in fun and active sports programming while also sharing in exciting STEM activities. Sports programs keep kids

active, teach friendly competition, and introduce healthy practices for life. STEM prepares students for a lifetime of critical thinking, collaboration, and



creative problem solving in the context of hands-on learning.

CHJC Recreation Opportunities (CHJC \$8,977)

CHJC maintains a beautiful campus suited perfectly for the facilitation of various recreation and sports activities. The generous space allow CHJC to provide high quality recreational services to program participants and offers a variety of sports and activities.

Encompass Recreational Programs (\$10,888)

This program provided recreational opportunities for youth with higher support needs. Some of the planned activities include Basketball, Lego Club, Bowling, Swimming, Running, Baseball, Soccer and Fishing.
