#### **Community Support**

The Youth Bureau provided opportunities for youth serving programs to share information and resources and for the community to respond to identified youth needs. The Youth Services Network provided information on the topics of: CHJC Community School Liaison Program; The Victim's Assistance Center's Child Advocacy Center; the Glenmont Job Corps; Planned Parenthood of the North Country; the Court Appointed Special Advocates Program; Youth Court; and the North Country Prenatal Perinatal overview of programs.

The Youth Services Network gathers information from all attendees about the programs they provide. Minutes are taken and posted on the Jefferson County Youth Bureau website.

#### **Recreation Scholarships**

19 girls & 26 boys ranging in age from five to nineteen received scholarships for activities such as gymnastics classes and various camps. Cornell Cooperative Extension offered "camp in a box" with a variety of activities for use at home. This was quite popular and successful and offered multiple opportunities and topics for youth to explore such as Space Exploration where youth learned about the constellations and how to build their own rocket.








### Youth Development

### The Young People

Programs reported 900 children and youth attending Youth Bureau funded programs. (Children may have been counted more than once if they attended more than one program.) The Covid-19 Global Pandemic impacted the number of programs offered to youth in 2022, the ability of agencies to reach out to youth, and the number of youth served.

Hearts For Youth (Hearts For Youth Inc. \$20,000)

A program focusing on life enrichment opportu-

nities that facilitate youth in volunteering and being an active and vital part of their community. After school



and summer programs encourage teamwork and camaraderie, building relationships, developing physical and cognitive skills and encouraging healthy, respectful, productive citizenship.

## Babysitting Course (North Country Prenatal/Perinatal Council \$3,500)

This course will prepare youth to start their own

babysitting business in the Community. They will learn the skills needed to safely care for children, including CPR and First Aid. Youth are provided oppor-



tunities for career exploration, work readiness skill development, job/employment training skills development and self-sufficiency skill development.

## Family Visitation Program (Resolution Center \$4,000)

This program provides separated families with an opportunity to receive enhanced visitation while promoting permanency and normalcy in the lives of children.



## Youth Development Continued

Teen Center Life Skills Program (Children's Home of Jefferson County \$30,700)

To help local youth become productive and healthy adults, the SoZo Teen Center focuses on health and wellness, academics, job

readiness, life skills, and civic engagement. Dedicated staff and volunteers provide positive role models and ensure a safe and



enriching environment. Nutritous snacks and hot dinners are served daily. All services are provided free of charge.

#### Lyme Central School Summer Theater Institute (\$6,800)

Participating students in grades K -12 worked together to produce and present a high quality theater production to the local community.

## Recreation Scholarships (Youth Bureau \$10,000)

Financial assistance helped to cover the costs of skill-building activities such as gymnastic classes and different camps for children from financially needy families. It was exciting to once again send youth to overnight summer camps!

## Child Abuse Prevention and Family Support

## The Q Center (ACR Health \$10,000)

The center provides services, activities and supports for our community's LGBTQ youth. The overall goal of the pro-



gram is improved health and social-emotional outcomes for LGBTQ youth and their families.

# Youth Sports And Education Opportunity Funding

## **Sports & STEM** (YMCA \$7,980)

Youth will engage in fun and active sports programming while



also sharing in exciting STEM activities. Sports programs keep kids active, teach friendly competition, and introduce healthy practices for life. STEM prepares students for a lifetime of critical thinking, collaboration, and creative problem solving in the context of hands-on learning.

## Clayton Youth Commission (\$1,832)

The program was established to encourage, supervise and maintain sports, fitness, recreational, educational and cultural programs for all youth through the age of 16. A variety of sports offered include Soccer, Basketball, Lacrosse, Softball, Golf, Baseball, Flag Football, Cheerleading and a tiny tots program which introduces toddlers to organized play.
